But many children - like this little girl do not go to school!


One out of every four children do not go to primary school...

It was first opened in 2006, in horse stables that were renovated by a team of young people from a school in England!


Six new classrooms have been built since then to make the school bigger.

Here is the School Kitchen!






Every child receives breakfast and a lunchtime meal daily

The School Day in Kenya...

"I have to get up at 5.00 a.m. each day. Many schools start at 7 a.m. and it is a long walk to get there!

We have assembly between 7 a.m. and 7.15 a.m. before our lessons begin. We have two break times, one at 9.20 a.m. for half an hour, when we have porridge to eat, and another at 11 a.m. Then we have lunch at 1 p.m. We usually eat rice and beans.

School lessons finish at 3.15 p.m., and then we have after-school activities and homework until 5 p.m.

Then I have to walk home again!"

The leaf, the leaf of the coconut tree, of the coconut tree when the wind blows against it It shakes... It shakes... It shakes...


